Fall 2019 Courses Recommended for the American Studies Major

American Studies, the oldest cross-disciplinary program at Washington College, is the closest thing to a DIY major at Washington College. It enables students to sample a number of disciplines not just as a preliminary to deciding on a major but as part of their major. It also provides the experience of double-majoring or even triple majoring within a single major, which greatly reduces the complexity of requirements, reduces the total number of courses students are required to take, and requires the completion of only a single Senior Capstone Experience rather than more. Cross-disciplinary training—competence in both humanities and social sciences disciplines—can be more in keeping with a variety of career choices—education, marketing, public service, law, public relations—than concentration in a single discipline.

Over half of the world's population lives in Asia, a region of remarkable cultural, ethnic, political, and economic diversity. Asia is massive, and it contains multitudes. Asian stories and Asian questions are fascinating, and understanding them will be critical to understand the world today and in the future. How does the rearming of Japan change its position in Asian and world politics? Why is China returning to Confucius? How do people today read the great philosophies of Laozi, Confucius, and the Buddha?

Asian Studies at Washington College provides an excellent complement to multiple majors, providing an inter-disciplinary focus on the study of Asia through language and additional academic fields. Minors may complete up to half of their required coursework at one of Washington College's four study abroad programs in Asia – The China Studies Institute at Peking University in Beijing, PRC; Lingnan University in Hong Kong; Yonsei University in Seoul, South Korea; and Meiji Gakuin University in Tokyo, Japan. At least half of the required coursework may be taken either through a Washington College short-term program in Asia or on campus with Washington College faculty.

Studying Europe's diverse past therefore is essential to understanding the world we live in.

Europe continues to play a central role in the globalized world of the twenty-first century: The European Union is a key actor on the political and economic world stage and an important stakeholder in topics of global concern, such as worldwide migration, environmental stewardship, or global security. Understanding Europe in its cultural, political, economic, and ethnic diversity is thus critical to shaping the future and developing solutions for such global challenges, as well as developing an insight into different cultures in their own right.

European Studies at Washington College provides an excellent complement to multiple majors, offering an interdisciplinary focus on the study of Europe through fields such as anthropology, business, economics, history, world languages and cultures, political science, as well as a semester (or winter/summer) of studying in Europe.

The options for studying abroad include WAC programs in England, Finland, France, Germany, Ireland, Italy, the Netherlands, Scotland, and Spain.
