Erin Counihan's truly innovative and inclusive work has greatly benefited her students, the College, the Secondary Education Program, the Department of Education, and the wider Kent and Queen Anne's County communities. Erin doesn't just teach what to do, or look for results via graded assignments, she models the concepts herself on a daily basis. She is always the first person in the department to introduce colleagues and students to a new online tool or platform. She takes it upon herself to learn new approaches and then will bring this knowledge and understanding



to her colleagues as well as applying it to the classroom. But she doesn't stop there, as Erin shared new technologies with the wider college community through CTL sessions and with the public school communities in Kent and Queen Anne's. Erin's teaching also stands out for her commitment to diversity, equity and inclusion. She works tirelessly to seek out and use readings, activities and resources that represent diverse experiences, identities and viewpoints. Key among her recent innovations is the modernization of EDU 315, Traditional and Modern Grammar, a course required by Maryland State Department of Education that many students found both dry and irrelevant. She saw an opportunity to modernize the course by challenging students to evaluate language through multiple lenses — cultural, racial, gender-based — and create awareness of problems that can stem from emphasizing a standard that is not all-inclusive. The work she is doing is a shining example of the belief that teaching should model effective and creative pedagogical decisions and actions for students. Not only does Erin teach about how to be a culturally responsive teacher, but she also models these attributes every single day.

following her hard-won 2021 victory as Campaign Manager for the re-election of Governor Phil Murphy, making her the first woman to manage a successful gubernatorial campaign in New Jersey. Mollie remains an integral part of Governor Murphy's political team, serving as a national strategist for Governor Murphy's efforts on behalf of New Jerseyans and the Democratic Party.

Since graduating from Washington College in 2007, Mollie has been very active in Federal and State politics, elections, grassroots advocacy, and issues management. Throughout her career, Mollie has managed or advised electoral campaigns of all shapes and sizes at the state and federal levels, developing expertise in large-scale mobilization and turnout programs for U.S. Senate and Presidential races. In the 2019–2020 cycle, she was the Western Director for Federal and Gubernatorial Campaigns at EMILY's List. She advised, advocated, and recruited pro-choice democratic women for electoral office.

Washington College was prepared to meet the challenges of COVID-19 thanks to the foresight and leadership of Charlene Perry. Long before COVID, Charlene founded the Kent County Health Care Emergency Response Coalition (HERC). HERC's mission was to develop and promote health emergency preparedness and response capabilities through leadership and teamwork, lessening the effects on the lives of Kent County citizens. She instituted monthly meetings and led HERC towards true emergency preparedness, with sound strategies for resource



allocation, along with drills and training exercises. Additionally, she served as a member of the College's Emergency Operations Group, sharing her expertise around emergency preparedness.

Charlene's leadership became essential again, when in December 2019, she alerted HERC after a novel coronavirus was identified overseas. Before there was even one confirmed case in the United States, Charlene had activated HERC and was planning the County's response. She was particularly concerned about our students and was an essential partner in the early planning and response. She worked tirelessly with the administration, reviewing plans, and offering guidance on critical operational elements such as testing, housing and compliance plans. She was a consistent resource for critical information and supplies that were difficult to secure on our own. She even assisted with setting up vaccine clinics just for Washington College's workforce at a time when vaccines were difficult to find.

Charlene demonstrated remarkable concern for and understanding of the College's operations, students, and resources. She was caring and compassionate, and acknowledged the importance of the relationship the College has with the greater Chestertown community. The trusting partnership and open collaboration with Charlene and the Health Department was essential to our ability to weather the last two years. It is because of her insistence that our institution embrace emergency preparedness that we were prepared to navigate through the pandemic.

Public health officials like Charlene are some of the true heroes of the pandemic. It is an honor and a privilege to be able to recognize an individual whose career was dedicated to keeping us and our neighbors safe for years. Charlene's work saved lives and we are eternally grateful for her forward-thinking leadership and friendship.
