Teacher licensure is a program and not a degree requirement. If a student does not complete licensure requirements before graduation, they can graduate with a content degree without licensure. Fingerprinting and background checks are required for entry into the full-time student-teaching internship only. Students completing early field experiences that begin in their first year enter buildings as volunteers and follow district requirements. Students must pass all initial Praxis tests before entry to the full-time teaching internship. The Praxis Core is the "basic skills test". The state will accept minimum SAT/ACT scores instead of Praxis. Students complete early fieldwork prior to the examination of standardized test scores.

Teacher candidates are required to spend the equivalent of a full year in a supervised student teaching internship experience at a partner school. While mentoring and support are ongoing by PreK-12 staff, each intern receives 15 hours of on-site support from IHE faculty. Each student teaching intern is supervised by a mentor teacher and a site coordinator. Two supervised experiences are required by students before they apply to the formal program. A dispositions rating is required by K-12 staff as part of the application package. Supervised clinical field experiences are also open to students interested in pursuing alternative preparation routes to teaching after graduation or private school employment.

Our undergraduate program only prepares general education teachers at both the elementary and secondary levels, but they practice in inclusive schools. All students take the course EDU 330 Diversity and Inclusion. The course is a rigorous introduction to special education that prepares general educators to meet the needs of students with disabilities in the general education classroom and work effectively with special educators, paraprofessionals, and related service providers. Strategies to effectively teach students with high-incidence disabilities are taught in all instructional methods coursework.

b. Participate as a member of individualized education program teams, as defined in section 614(d)(1)(B) of the *Individuals with Disabilities Education Act*.

Student teaching interns are required to attend IEP meetings with their mentor (cooperating) teachers. Students examine mock IEP meetings during EDU 330 Diversity and Inclusion course prior to student teaching.
